


Provide better outcomes for victims of abuse, neglect, and sexual assault — and the families that support them — to ensure their long-term success.

Why We Serve

In 2015, there were over 170,000 Child Safety Investigations in Los Angeles County. More than 85% of those investigations were due to physical, sexual abuse or neglect.*

Abuse is reported countywide amongst boys and girls in all age groups, but a large percentage is associated with infants and toddlers.





More than 60% of child abuse cases reported in Los Angeles County are evaluated by the expert staff at VIP. Children, teens, and their caregivers are referred to VIP because of our long-standing commitment of going beyond traditional care to help clients become their best selves through innovative programs.

Our Philosophy

"What do you need?" and "How can we help?" These two questions encapsulate the core of VIP's model of care. Our goal is to build trust with our clients by providing tailored services that meet their individual needs in a safe, caring environment.

Every day in L.A. County, 30 children are removed from their home by children's services. VIP sees 15–20 of those children.

A Bright Future for Kids

For children who have experienced trauma, abuse, or neglect, the earlier we can address their emotional wounds, the greater likelihood that we can make a lasting difference in giving them what they need to succeed and ultimately, break the cycle of abuse.

Below are a few highlights from programs that directly impact the lives of our children.

Birth to 5

Many of the mothers who turn to VIP for help are young, had an unplanned pregnancy and/or were previously exposed to violence and abuse. These factors can make it difficult for them to connect with their young ones, sometimes resulting in perpetuating the cycle of neglect and/or abuse.



Birth to 5 is an innovative program that provides early intervention to create positive lasting effects for both baby and caregiver. Through therapies that work directly with both the child and caregiver, we are able to offer them the tools to cope with their stress and trauma in healthy ways.

This past year, VIP reached a major milestone by beginning to offer services in two local **Early Education Centers**, allowing us to address the needs of preschoolers and their families.

FASD Programs

One in 100 children are born with **Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD)** — affecting more children than Cerebral Palsy, Cystic Fibrosis, Down Syndrome, SIDS, and Spina Bifida combined. Children with FASD can experience developmental delays, learning disabilities, and have difficulty managing their day-to-day lives. Left unaddressed or untreated, many will have issues finding gainful employment, be incarcerated in their lifetimes, and will have ongoing mental health issues.

Our FASD Programs are one of the largest in the country, providing diagnosis and treatment to an underserved population of children affected by FASD as well as supporting their caregivers through early education and counseling. Over the last year, the FASD program has continued to grow as VIP continues to be one of the very few mental health agencies in Southern California providing services to families impacted by FASD. In 2016, 58 caregivers benefited from FASD interventions at VIP and received the skills and tools needed to work with their child.

School-based Program

Visiting our offices for mental health services can prove to be challenging for children with limited access to transportation and/or trauma induced stress. VIP launched our school-based program in 2010, which offers onsite care directly to students and creates a support system where they need it most — at school. This past year, the program grew exponentially into 24 elementary, middle and high schools, with several more on the way — the largest number of schools we have been in to date!

VIP is the only 24/7 medical facility for foster care children and provides care for 70% of all foster children in L.A. County.

Giving Teens a New Start

The teens and young adults we see at VIP are some of our most difficult cases and the challenges they face are multi-faceted and growing.

Foster Teens & Transitional-Aged Youth — Many of our teens have been in the foster care system for most of their lives, experiencing severe trauma that results in behaviors caregivers can find difficult to manage.

Once foster teens reach adulthood, there is little support to help them transition out of the system. Many end up on the streets, have issues finding employment or completing school, and/or become victims of trafficking.

Commercially Sexually Exploited Children (CSEC) — Los Angeles County is a major hub for the commercial exploitation of children, with some victims as young as 10 years old. Almost all of these children have previously been in the child welfare system and have a history of abuse or neglect.

High-risk Youth — VIP also recognizes the need to provide services to teens discharged from probation, pregnant and parenting teens, and other high-risk youth in the community.

LGBTQ Foster Youth & Adults — We know that one in five foster youth in Los Angeles identify as LGBTQ and have their own specific medical, mental health, and advocacy needs. For the LGBTQ community, these services can be difficult to locate and access, particularly in the East Los Angeles region.

Thanks in large part to your generous support, VIP is in the final phases of completing construction of the **Leonard Hill Hope Center**, a new comprehensive service center that will bring together services for high-risk and foster care transitional youth to successfully transition into adulthood. These services will include private and group therapy, tutoring, support to complete high school and prepare for college, life-skills classes, computer classes, and case management.

There is no other center like this available to youth in the East Los Angeles region.

The Leonard Hill Hope Center will officially open in September 2017.

Compassionate Care Through the Adolescent Care and Transition (ACT) Clinic

Last year, VIP opened our Adolescent Care and Transition (ACT) Clinic at the VIP Children's Medical Village, which serves as a medical and special resources home for these highly vulnerable populations. The ACT Clinic offers ongoing medical care and provides access to social workers, therapists and case managers to meet the unique needs of these youth.

In our first full year of providing services, we provided ongoing care to over 750 young adults.

At the end of the year, VIP started a medical unit in the ACT Clinic to address the unique needs of LGBTQ foster youth, including specialized medical care, mental health care, hormone treatment, locating LGBTQ-friendly housing, and legal advocacy. The need for these services are so great that the clinic already has a waiting list for services.

In addition, VIP launched our specialized clinic for commercially sexually exploited children (CSEC). The Succeeding Through Achievement and Resilience (STAR) Court (a victim-centered court in Los Angeles that supports youth who are survivors of commercial sexual exploitation and trafficking) designated the VIP CSEC Clinic as their primary referral site for ongoing medical care and support. Since opening, the CESC Clinic is seeing approximately 100 youth per month.



VIP is the sole-source provider of Youth Placement Stabilization services in L. A. County for children and teens in the foster care system.

Serving the Whole Family

Most of the families we work with live at or below the poverty line and face significant financial hardships in their day-to-day lives. For many of our caregivers, it is an overwhelming challenge to meet the basic needs of their families.

H.E.A.R.T. (Helping Ease Abuse Related Trauma) is a membership group that works to raise funds for and offer support to the child victims of abuse receiving services at VIP. Comprised of advocates, professionals and philanthropists, our members have created a community dedicated to making a thoughtful impact on the lives of abused children and the caregivers who strive to keep them safe.

Our H.E.A.R.T. members and community-minded Friends of H.E.A.R.T. donate \$1,000 or more every year to support the "essential nonessentials", items that help our children and their families meet their most basic needs that are still so critical on their path to healing. With the support of H.E.A.R.T., VIP clinicians and case managers can ensure that the family unit is strengthened and supported as the client and their family work toward their mental health goals. By providing services that focus on parenting support, emergency relief and unmet needs, VIP can help our clients in an integrated and holistic way.

Here are just a few of the many ways H.E.A.R.T. donations have made a lasting difference in the families we serve.

\$24 towards a bus pass for Renee to get to her appointments at VIP.

\$52 to pay for Melissa's college application fees.

\$80 to help purchase a high school graduation package for Joe.

\$230 to help new mom Kristina purchase a safe car seat for her baby.

\$115 for art classes so that Miranda could have a healthy outlet to express her feelings.

\$185 to ensure that Abraham has proper glasses to see at school.

\$550 for emergency housing to protect Amelia and her son fleeing a dangerous domestic violence situation.

\$750 to buy enough beds so Julia and her four children wouldn't be sleeping on the floor.

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
VIP Impact — By the Numbers




